## Emeritus Spotlight: John Sculley WG'63



John Sculley: a remarkable journey far beyond Pepsi and Apple

There are three unique things you should know about John Sculley, featured speaker at our Saturday, May 14
Reunion Lunch at The Inn at

Penn.

First, we can barely hint at his remarkable life and career in these few words, so we'll note his autobiography later on. Second, we can't think of another executive who demonstrates such a high level of management ability and entrepreneurship across so many fields of business.

Third, his accomplishments in highly demanding, competitive environments are truly phenomenal in view of a major physical problem he has had all through life. His penchant for business involvement with "opportunity for game-changing transformation" is nowhere better exhibited than in his own transition.

A week after John was born in April 1939 in New York City, his family moved to Bermuda, where his Mother's family had arrived in 1620. At 11, he enrolled in St. Mark's School in Southborough, Massachusetts. After St. Mark's, he got a bachelor's degree in architectural design from Brown University in 1961 and his MBA here at Wharton in 1963.

Incredibly, in all those years, he dealt with a severe stutter and stammer, with him since early childhood. It didn't slow him down, though. Elected class president when he got to St. Marks, he kept that position until graduation. His speaking got much better at Brown and Wharton.

When he went to work, it became a major rallying point. Public speaking was vital in business. He knew concentration, increasing confidence and learning to live with the problem were keys to the future. He handled it. Now he speaks all over the world to groups about his belief that this is a great time to create shareholder value in private companies. Listeners pay attention.

In 1967, John joined PepsiCo as a trainee. In three years, he became the company's youngest marketing vice president. While there, his consumer research study evolved into "The Pepsi Generation" and "Pepsi Challenge." These marketing programs helped Pepsi pass Coke as the country's largest-selling packaged soft drink.

John's responsibilities also included managing the PepsiCo International Food
Division – the company's only money-losing area. In three years, it made \$300 million revenue and \$40 million profit. In 1983, Apple's Steve Jobs called and the famous "sugar water/change the world" quote was heard 'round the world.

Apple wanted John to apply his considerable consumer package goods marketing skills to personal computers. When he joined Apple, it paid off in dramatic fashion. He helped launch the Macintosh computer with the legendary "1984" commercial, introduced "Apple Desktop Publishing" and Apple's "Powerbook." These game-changing creations helped Apple become the world's best-selling personal computer in the late 80s.

After 10 years at Apple, John started a company with his brothers to mentor and build up private companies, eventually sold to private equity firms or public corporations. He now mentors hard-charging CEOs in healthcare, financial services, social media marketing, employment staffing and 3D animation entertainment. His incredible drive is led by the need to discover how things work and find a better way!

John now lives in Palm Beach, Florida and travels the world for fun – when he has time. Awarded "Marketing Person of the Year" by *Ad Week* and *Advertising Age* and "Marketing CEO of the Decade" by *Financial World* magazine, John was also selected by Mikhail Gorbachev for the "International Foundation for the Survival and Development of Mankind" board. We eagerly await his remarks on May 14.

John's notable autobiography is *Odyssey: Pepsi to Apple: A Journey of Adventure, Ideas and the Future.* If you ask, we bet he'll sign your copy at the luncheon!

#### When You Come Back

This column will give you a heads up on a few fun things to do on your next visit back to school, which we hope is May Reunion! We've concentrated here on (1) a special thing to do on campus (2) a convenient, unique restaurant (3) a famous city attraction.

Campus Spot: The Elite Eight Outdoor Art Treasures When you come back for reunion, you'll want to take a stroll past all eight of the priceless Penn campus "photo op" outdoor works of art. We'll give these to you in walking order, but it will be helpful to take a campus map along.

Three of these treasures center on Ben Franklin: (1) Youthful Ben in front of Weightman Hall on 33rd St, as he arrived here in 1723 at 19 years old. (2) Seated Ben, a little more sedate and stately, is in front of College Hall in Blanche Levy Park, centered between 34th, 36th, Walnut and Spruce Streets, best entered by Locust or Woodland Walks. (You'll find the third Ben further up the road a little later.)

Blanche Levy Park has three other of these special pieces, too. They include (3) Split Button by Claes Oldenburg, in front of nearby Van Pelt-Dietrich Library Center, quite close to Seated Ben. It's been a Penn icon since 1981. In between Myerson Hall and Fisher Fine Arts Bldg is

(4) Jerusalem Stabile by Alexander Calder. It's very big and very red. A short walk away, just beyond where Locust and Woodland Walks split is (5) LOVE, by Robert Indiana, one of several variations on the original he created in 1966 (see photo).

Leaving the park and heading up Locust Walk, you soon come to **(6) Ben on the Bench** at 37th St and Locust Walk (see photo). This is one spot where you may want a camera, as it's a very popular souvenir and there's no charge. Continuing on up Locust Walk to 39th St, Alexander Liberman's **(7) Covenant** looms overhead in all its scarlet glory. Although highly polarizing in 1975 when installed, it's now frequently used as a focus in giving directions. One thing is sure – you can't miss it!

The final stop on our tour is at the northeast corner of Woodland Walk, at 37th and Spruce Streets, and it's really different. It's (8) The Class of 1956 Trolley Car, a replica from the days when street level trolleys took students all over the campus and the city. Though not built until 2006, it is historically correct. One end exhibits a recreation of a period trolley interior. The other end toward Spruce Street houses the stairway down to the SEPTA 37th and Spruce Street rail station platform — believe it or not. If you have the kids with you, they won't want to miss this one!

#### Restaurant: Bobby's Burger Palace

Opened in early 2010 at 3925 Walnut Street in the "Radian" - practically on campus - this is one of well-known chef Bobby Flay's latest spots, with burgers made to order. Open until midnight weekends, it's an oasis for an intriguing variety of burgers, turkey, chicken, cheese, salads, sides, sodas, shakes, malteds, beer and wine.

They have kid's menus, too, and you can also get your burger crunchy — topped with potato chips. Prices are friendly and the service is good. This author of nine cookbooks and Food Network Star owns restaurants all over the U.S and in the Bahamas. He knows how to give you what you like and he serves it in style. #### City Attraction: Elfreth's Alley

In 1702, a block-long Philadelphia street, connecting two blacksmith shops, opened near the waterfront. To this day, it has been continually inhabited and is now one of the oldest and most vital early American streetscapes. A National Register Historic

District, more than 3,000 immigrants and citizens have lived here in those 300-plus years. Today, 32 homes built between 1728 and 1836 line both sides of the alley.

On 2nd Street between Race and Arch Streets, it features a Museum and Gift Shop at 124-126 – the only buildings open to the public. There are Museum Tours, and the Gift Shop sells craft goods, decorative items and books, including a Self-Guided Walking Tour of the exteriors. The museum can also give you information about free cell phone tours, which feature detailed stories of the homes, or you can visit elfrethsalley.org to find out more.

This is one of the most important "living streets" in America — a place where you can innately feel and see what early American life was all about. Don't miss it!
